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The Election: An Editorial

Tomorrow and Friday we elect the Student Senate Executive Board which will represent us next year. The Setonian feels that this election is one of the most important and vital events happening on the SHU campus throughout the course of the year. It is for this reason that we present this special issue.

Our Position

Previous Student Senates have been sterile, non-productive organs of little or no value to Seton Hall. But this year's group under the direction of President Dennis Wynne has been a productive, positive asset to the SHU student and the University as a whole. Much has been accomplished. Much more remains to be done.

This year the groundwork has been laid and the first steps taken towards a truly active, efficient and effective student governing organization. Next year's president and executive board must be thoroughly capable and totally dedicated to the continuation and expansion of this year's Senate successes.

We have been shown that the Student Senate system has great potentiality. We must not regress into another era of Senate stagnation. Rather we must advance into a period of greater productivity.

For this reason this week's election is of great importance to each of us in particular and the University in general. Because of this significance the Setonian has been prompted to support a slate of candidates for next year's Student Senate Executive Board.

The constitution of the Setonian states, in part, "that the right of the student press to give editorial endorsement to candidates for student offices is an essential aspect of a free press. The exercise of this right must not taint the objectivity of the news report."

The Setonian Editorial Board feels that not only do we have the basic right to support a candidate, but that we possess the strong and undeniable responsibility to the student body to do so. Because of the great significance of this election, we feel that we must represent the student's position with a full, thorough and careful analysis of the situation. This analysis has led us to the conclusion that one slate of candidates and its platform is eminently more qualified to fill the roles of the Student Senate Executive Board for next year.

This is a precedent-making decision. Never before, to our knowledge, has the Setonian supported a slate of student candidates. This choice was forced upon us by the social responsibility of this newspaper to the student body and the University. It is only after the deepest thought and the most thorough consideration that this choice has been made.

Our Choice

The significance of this election demands a close inspection of all candidates and platform planks. The Setonian Editorial Board undertook such an in-depth analysis in reviewing the two slates. Point for point and candidate for candidate we strongly recommend the following for election:

The Unity Party, under the direction of Tom Heim for president, represents to us, the most qualified and capable personnel and the most realistic, positive and informed platform.

The individuals involved seem to have the total dedication to the student position and Seton Hall's welfare which these posts require. They possess the intelligence, knowledge of the University and leadership ability necessary to get the job done.

But ability is not enough. The Unity Party candidates exhibit a school before self attitude which has been all too lacking in the past. Senate Elections Thur. Fri: Two Parties Vie For Posts

The Student Senate Executive Board elections will be held tomorrow and Friday. Voting will be in the basement of the Student Center in the bookstore lobby from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day. All students are eligible to vote.

Balloting will be by mechanical voting booths. Each student is eligible to vote for one candidate for President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary. Students must present their SHU ID cards or some other form of valid identification before entering the hall.

Senator Robert Sando, Chairman of the Student Senate Election Committee, reminded all candidates and their supporters that the election is an opportunity on the basement level of the Student Center. He also points out that "we can exactly type out Seton Hall can break a new tradition and have a plurality of students voting. Fellow Students,
We have been given 250 words to state our position and to propose a rebuttal to the editorial in this edition of the Setonian. We were informed on Thursday night April 14th that the editorial board had voted to support our opposition in the editorial; this we thought was quite considerate as their voting had taken place on Wednesday, April 6th. We were informed at an interview that each party would be informed immediately after the voting results of the board had been turned in. We would like to thank the editor for informing us when he did, because if he had waited two days longer it would have been impossible to place anything in this space.

The interview of which we spoke consisted of four members of the Setonian staff, two of the four namely Donald McKenna (editor in chief, 19 65-66) and Robert Wyndrem (newly elected editor in chief for 1966-67) were very active in the interview. We considered the "unbiased activity" quite humorous since both men were involved in the forming of an opposition party in recent weeks. During this "non-partisan" interview we expressed our feelings about the Setonian backing a candidate. We opposed the support of the newspaper to either party since the Setonian is the only mode of written communication on campus. There is no possibility of dissenting views to be printed in another paper.

We hope that each student will realize the situation and will not be swayed by the Setonian and the seven voting members of editorial board. We urge each student to take an active interest in this election, study each man and each platform and then cast your vote. We sincerely hope that we Row A will receive your full support.

This platform is more than a series of empty promises. 1. The adoption of a new system for cuts. This system would call for either unlimited cuts or an extension of our present "cut" system.
2. The announcement of the formation and publishing dates of the school social calendar. All classes, clubs, fraternities and other student organizations having preference to each date.
3. The elimination of more than one final exam per day.
4. The permission of the administration to allow the varsity basketball team to participate in regular season games scheduled on major metropolitan arenas.
5. The coordination of the Football Club and Student Senate on a proposed Fall Home Coming Week end, which would include a properly planned and victory dance.
6. The institution of departmental examinations for all basic courses.
7. The elimination of the 1000 hour minimum requirement on campus.
8. The opening of the University Center facilities a week for at least one month prior to final exams.
9. Full support of the newly organized Disaster Club.
10. The formation of a Corporate Hall Student Affairs Council.

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Seton Sports Summaries

Pirates' Norm Dermody scored the winning run on Tom Bongiorno's singles in the 10th inning to give Seton Hall a 9-8 victory over Ithaca College at South Field Sunday. The Pirates won their fifth straight game, ending the Bombers' down to their third loss in five outings.

Dermody, the third Hall starter, took over in the eighth after Bill Cook had worked the first two innings. A wild pitch, an infield out, and Jerry Fyoff's single produced two runs to tie the score at 8-8. Dermody scattered three hits and passed one batter while pitching shutout ball in his three-inning stint. In winning three against one loss, the junior right hander has given up only one earned run in 24 innings for an ERA of 0.33.

Pirates' Costly

The Pirates had only six hits with Walt Peto getting two and Bongiorno driving in three runs. Six errors and 12 walks proved fatal for Ithaca.

The Pirates, who had leads of 4-2 and 8-6, finally broke up

the game in the tenth. Dermody walked. When first baseman George Valesene made a double error on Phil DeFrancisco's sacrifice bunt, Dermody raced to third and the batter to second.

Lefty John Bragley, who had blanked Fairleigh Dickinson on Saturday, then replaced Joe McAvoy on the hill. He fanned Skip Scott and Dick Waczak to top up. Then with a 3-0 count, Bongiorno lined a single to right to score Dermody.

Rutgers

Despite a late Rutgers rally, Seton Hall led by Bill Matusz and Tom Bongiorno, won its third game April 9 by a 4-3 score. Matusz, in winning his second game against no defects, showed his ability to weather a storm when he held the Scarlet Knights through the crucial innings. It was Bill's third victory in three years over the New Brunswick side. Tommy Bongiorno and Skip Scott once again sparked the offense.

Princeton

Norm Dermody, fourteenth in College ERA last season, took a step in the same direction last Thursday when he shut out the Tigers of Princeton, 3-0. It was Norm's second

victory. The first coming against Vermont at Seton Hall. Six errors by the Princetonians provided the Bucs with enough breaks to control the game.

Fairleigh Dickinson

Bill Matusz continued the Pirate scoreless streak Wednesday with a 8-0 shutout over Met Conference foe, Fairleigh Dickinson. Matusz, now 3-0, fanned a brilliant 4-batter at the Knights while the Buc bats boomed out an eight-run attack. It moved the Pirate record in the conference to 1-0. Next conference game will be Fordham April 27.

Wagner

Don Kammann, a senior southpaw, gained his first varsity start Saturday and with it his initial varsity win and shutout. Tom Kammann, mainly a reliever last year, held the Seahawks to three hits, which were well-scattered. Pirate hitters also tore the Wagner defense apart with a big 4-run fourth. The shut-out marked 27 straight scoreless innings for the Bucs.
