CONTRIBUTORS

Schalom Ben-Chorin, Editor of the German-language Israeli newspaper Yediot Chadashot, is the founder and spiritual leader of the first Jewish Reform Congregation in Jerusalem. He studied philosophy, literature, and comparative religion at the University of Munich and is the author of several books, among them Die Antwort des Jona and Bruder Jesus.

Sofia Marchesa dei Cavalletti has a doctorate from the University of Rome and another degree in Semitic philology. Her main field of study is rabbinical theology; she has written several articles for learned journals. She is a leader in the field of contemporary catechesis. Among her several books is *Teaching Doctrine and Liturgy—The Montessori Approach*.

Père Henri Cazelles, S.S., has a doctorate in theology as well as degrees in political science and law. Professor of Old Testament Studies at the Institut Catholique in Paris, he has written and edited several books on the Old Testament. His latest study is Naissance de l'église, secte Juive rejetée? He is at present Visiting Professor at the School of Theology, Claremont, California.

Dr. Ernst Ludwig Ehrlich is European Director of B'nai B'rith—International Council. His main fields of study are history of Judaism, contemporary history, and Christian theology. Among his books are a history of the Jews in Germany, a history of ancient Israel up to the destruction of the Temple, and Kultsymbolik des Alten Testaments und des nachbiblischen Judentums.

Father Edward H. Flannery, who pursued his theological studies in Paris and Washington, is Executive Secretary of the American Bishops' Secretariat for Catholic-Jewish Relations. He is also a member of the Institute of Judaeo-Christian Studies and the Editorial Board of THE BRIDGE. He is author of The Anguish of the Jews, Twenty-three Centuries of Anti-Semitism.

Josephine Massingberd Ford holds a doctoral degree from the University of Nottingham. At present, she teaches at the University of Notre Dame.

Her major field is the rabbinical background and exegesis of the New Testament. She has written for a host of learned journals; her latest book is *The Spirit and the Human Person*.

Father Herbert Haag, Ph.L., S.S.L., S.T.D., studied at the Institut Catholique, the Ecole Biblique, and Brandeis University; he is Professor of Old Testament at the University of Tübingen. As a biblical theologian, his work has centered on evolution and the doctrine of creation as well as original sin and Scripture. He is on the Board of Theologische Quartalschrift and Editor of the second edition of Bibel Lexikon. One of his books, Is Original Sin in Scripture?, was recently published here.

L'abbé Kurt Hruby pursued his studies in Jerusalem, Louvain, and Paris. He is Professor of Rabbinical Hebrew at the Institut Catholique in Paris and Visiting Professor at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. He has written many learned articles in the field of Jewish studies and lectured widely on ecumenical problems.

Rabbi David H. Panitz is the spiritual leader of Temple Emanuel in Paterson, New Jersey. He did his graduate work at Johns Hopkins University and was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Author of Studies in the Legal Responsa of Joseph Colon: Researches in 15th Century Italian Jewish History, he has also written numerous articles.

Rabbi Jakob J. Petuchowski, Ph.D., is Professor of Rabbinics and Jewish Theology at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. He is author of *Ever Since Sinai* and *Prayerbook Reform in Europe*, as well as several other books and numerous articles. He edited the liturgy for the synagogue at Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem.

Kurt Schubert, Ph.D., is founder and Director of the Institute of Jewish Studies at the University of Vienna, Chairman of the Association of Catholic University Graduates, and author of Die Religion des nachbiblischen Judentums. He is Editor of Der Historische Jesus und der Christus unseres Glaubens as well as of the journal Kairos.

Pater Clemens Thoma, Ph.D., S.V.D., is Instructor and Research Assistant at the Institute of Jewish Studies, University of Vienna, and Reader in Old Testament and Hebrew at St. Gabriel's Seminary, Mödling, Austria. His

major field is early Judaism (500 B.C. to 500 A.D.). He has published several papers and edited *Judentum und christlicher Glaube* as well as *Auf den Trümmern des Tempels*.

Michael Wyschogrod, Ph.D., is Associate Professor of Philosophy at Baruch College, City University of New York. His interests revolve around existentialism, philosophy of religion, Jewish philosophy and theology. He is on the editorial boards of *Tradition* and *Judaism*, and the author of *Kierkegaard and Heidegger—The Ontology of Existence*, as well as many articles.
