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Course Summary:

The Catholic Peacemaking course offers an introduction to the understanding and practice of Catholic peacemaking as experienced through the centuries. Students will integrate the knowledge of four areas of exploration:

- 1- Catholic contributions to a contemporary understanding of peace
- 2- The appreciation of the changing context in which this understanding has evolved, especially through the encounter with relevant Catholic Peacemakers
- 3- The identification of peace as a relevant contemporary challenge that must be confronted by each Catholic and by the Church as a whole
- 4- Consistent with a contemporary Catholic understanding of peace, the elaboration of responses by the students, on one side, to the yearning for peace of poor and oppressed peoples, and on the other, to perceived threats to peace

Each student will present on an historical case.

Student Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, students will know the key concepts, models, theories, and debates involved in the study of catholic peacemaking; the institutional evolution of Catholic contribution to international politics, including international organizations, and international law; and exposure to the social science research process.

Expectations and Grading:

One weekly written response to the Study Guide of Kenneth Melchin, *Living with Other People* once a week for the first seven weeks. Comments are due on Blackboard at 9:00 AM on the morning of the class session (20%). Assignment done individually.

One five-page “Catholic peace-maker profile,” to be presented in the final thirty minutes of a class session. Paper is due on Blackboard at 9:00 AM on the morning of the class session (20%). The paper can be done as a single paper turned in by the group, or multiple shorter papers turned in by the individual members on specific aspects of the peacemaker. Any presentation materials, PowerPoint, etc. should be posted to Blackboard prior to the start of class.

Participation in discussion demonstrably informed by the reading and assigned short memos (20%). Participation grade will also include such things as frequently commenting on the

readings or class topics via the forum in Blackboard, and volunteering for small assignments in class, such as providing a brief definition or explanation of a term referenced in class.

Final paper of 15 pages on a topic of your choice. During the last three weeks of the class, presentation of argument to the class (Presentation 10%; Final Paper 30%).
