Course Objectives:

This class is the capstone of your graduate experience. As such, you will be drawing on the lessons that you have learned in DIPL 6310 to develop and execute a research project. The class will be a mix of one-on-one sessions as well as traditional meetings.

My goals for you are two-fold:

- Write a publishable quality manuscript that tests hypotheses head to head either qualitatively or quantitatively.
- Finish this class with a polished op-ed based on your research that's ideal to submit for publication and as a writing sample for a job.

Course Materials:

Two textbooks have been ordered for this course. We will not have assignments from these texts. The Van Evera work is a good reference for qualitative work, and the Johnson and Reynolds text is geared for quantitative work.
